Driver Education Saves Lives!

The Governor's Highway Safety Association (GHSA), released a new report on teen driving.

What Does the Report Say?

The analysis of 20 years of Fatality Analysis Reporting System (FARS) data found that fatal crashes involving a young driver (15-20 years of age) fell 38%, while they increased nearly 8% for drivers 21 and older. At the same time, deaths of young drivers fell 45%, compared to an 11% increase in fatalities for older drivers. Yes, young people are less likely to drive today than they were 20 years ago, but this accounts for only a small portion of the large decrease.

Why the Decline?

What's driving these declines? Graduated driving licensing, parental involvement, driver education and training, impactful peer-to-peer programs, vehicle technology, and teen-specific apps.

How to Continue the Decrease of Teen Traffic Fatalities?

To continue the gains in teen driver safety, we need to build upon these proven countermeasures and add another -- incorporate technology (including electric vehicles) and driver responsibility into education. As vehicle technology continues to evolve, ensuring that our youngest and riskiest drivers understand it and use it correctly is critical. GHSA recommends that more information on vehicle safety features be incorporated into driver education programs, along with guidance on driving electric vehicles. These education efforts should also focus on the safety of people walking, biking, or scooting so that novice drivers understand their role in protecting everyone on the road.

How Can ANSTSE Help?

In discussing driver training and education in the report, GHSA calls on states to use the **Novice Teen** Driver Education and Training Administrative Standards (NTDETAS) to make incremental improvements to their programs, as well as ensure that education and training are available to all and the curricula are culturally equitable. Links to the NTDETAS, Standards State Self-Assessment tool, AN-STSE checklist to help states and providers apply cultural equity to their programs, and Pro**ject C.R.U.I.S.E.** are embedded in the report. The report also calls upon states to bolster parent/guardian and other adult involvement by requiring a novice driver's parent or guardian to complete a seminar utilizing the ANSTSE guidance document addressing the **Core Elements of Driver Education Parent**/ Guardian Seminars.
